Example: It was raining when we arrived. • Past perfect: actions that happened before another past event. Example: The film had already started when we got there.

Page 137 – Grammar 3B: The Position of Adverbs and Adverbial Phrases

Main Rules: • Adverbs of frequency (always, usually, never) go before the main verb or after “be”. • Adverbs of manner (quickly, fluently) go after the verb or object. • Adverbs of time/place (yesterday, at home) go at the end. • Adverbs of degree (very, really, too) go before adjectives or adverbs.
